WHAT WE DO: THE DEPARTMENT OF RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT, MANAGEMENT AND COMPLIANCE

The Department of Resource Development, Management and Compliance (RDMC) in the Office of the President at South Texas College (STC) promotes the identification and acquisition of external funds and supports compliance with grants that are awarded to the college. Staff members provide pre-award services, which promote the long-term financial growth of the institution. Grant Development Officers provide technical assistance for the development of fundable proposals that align to one or more of the Strategic Directions of South Texas College. Grants and Contract Compliance Officers provide post-award support for Project Directors and Financial Managers. Guidance and technical assistance from our department is designed to support consistent compliance with applicable regulations, policies, and guidelines from funding agencies.

This agreement provided funding for post-secondary education/training services through an Integrated Education and Training model for a total of 168 students. Region One Education Service Center (Region One ESC) provided high school equivalency services and South Texas College (STC) provided training for 124 individuals in the following areas: Certified Nurse Assistant, EKG Technician, Phlebotomy Technician, Forklift Operator, and Welding, which lead to Industry Recognized Certifications. In addition, 44 students participated in both the Medical Office Specialist and Precision Manufacturing Technology Certificate Programs. This award aligns to Strategic Direction #1, Lead Community Engagement, by advancing mutually beneficial community and educational partnerships with Region One Education Service Center.

This award through the Lower Rio Workforce Development Board in partnership with STC and the Weslaco Economic Development Corporation (EDC) provided funding for training and equipment for 24 participants enrolled in Machinery Mechanics, an industry-recognized certification program.

The \$24,058 from the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) added to the \$28,608 previously awarded from The Weslaco Economic Development Corporation has contributed to matching funds and allows for a total amount of \$52,666 for this grant.

Part of the standards for national accreditation is to maintain high standards in foodservice and this aligns with operating the highest quality program for our students and their children. Support from this grant allows center management to purchase food, supplies, equipment, and service for preparing and serving nutritious meals for children enrolled in the Mid Valley Child Care Center.

Reducing child care costs for students to help them continue their educational goals. 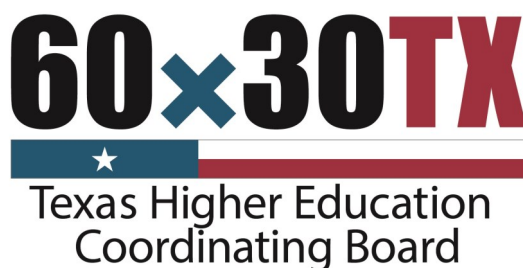

Funds from the National Science Foundation (NSF) were used to develop a program for regional network connectivity. The college participated in a consortium with five Texas colleges as part of the Lonestar Education and Research Network (LEARN). The LEARN consortium focused on bringing sophisticated technology and accompanying expertise to students and faculty choosing to pursue Science Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) research focused opportunities at STC.

The college's Information Services, Planning, Performance & Strategic Initiatives Division also contributed \$42,450 in infrastructure support costs for training, professional development and educational activities, increased connectivity, and network upgrades that promote better academic data flow for Campus Cyberinfrastructure.

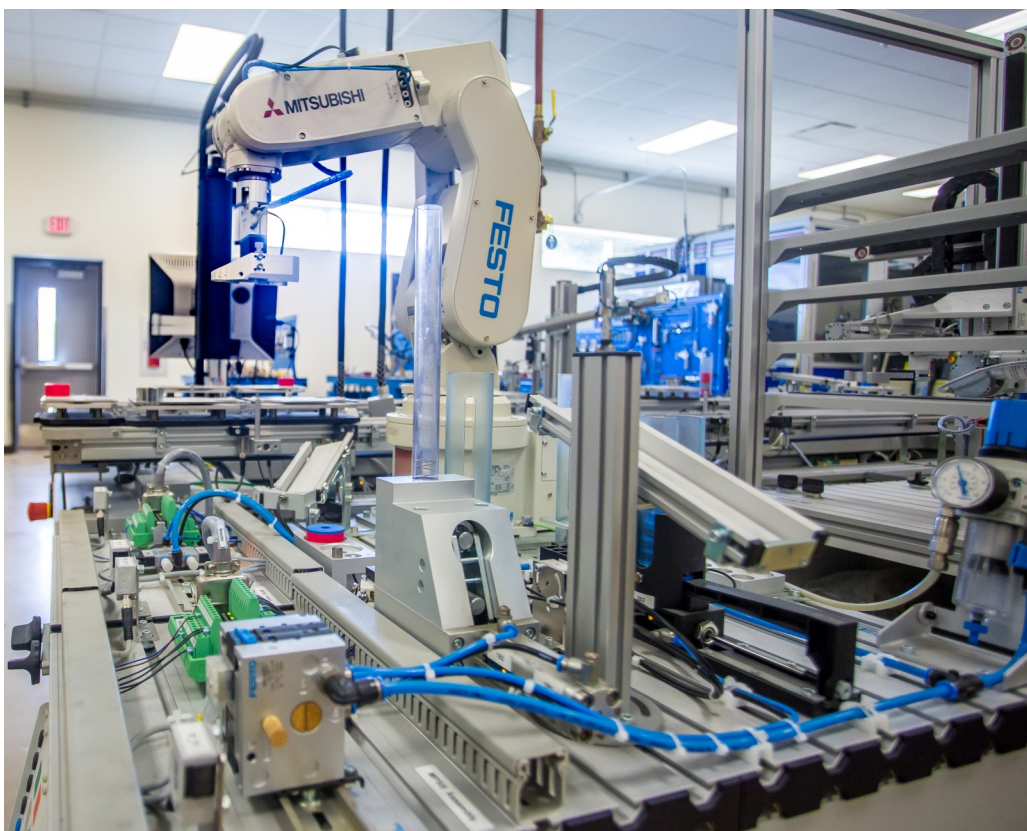

This grant helped increase the total number of high skilled, high wage manufacturing jobs in the Rio Grande Valley by providing customized upskill training for new and incumbent workers in occupations in Advanced Manufacturing or Robotics who are employed in the City of McAllen.

Funds were used for materials and supplies, salaries, and travel expenses for the Institute of Advanced Manufacturing (IAM). This grant was approved by the City of McAllen, City Commissioners meeting in September 2020.

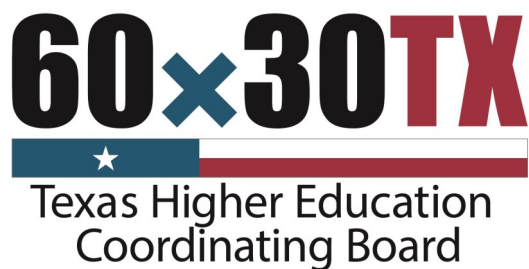

The funds align to Strategic Direction#5, Cultivate Institutional Excellence by increasing the college-going culture in the region through community outreach for the nursing program at STC.



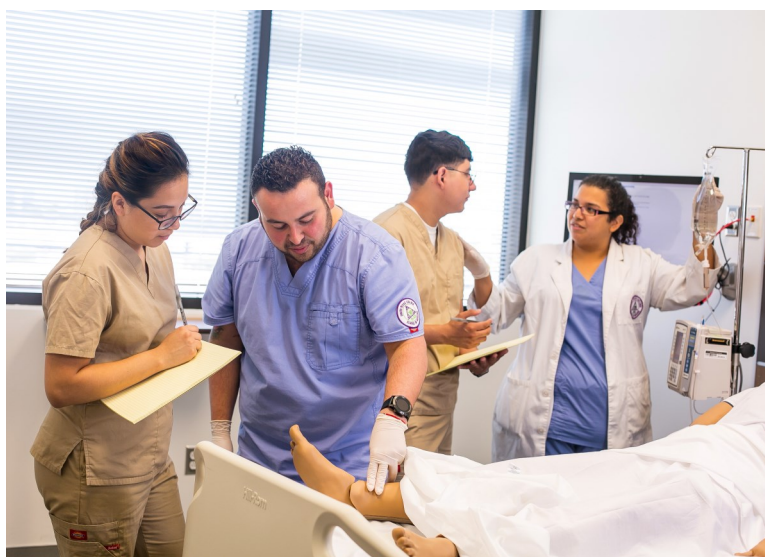

These additional funds were for the fiscal year 2019 for the Division of Allied Nursing and Health to recruit and retain students enrolled in the Associate Degree Nursing Program (ADN). The additional funds were used for costs exclusively related to enrolling additional students, nursing faculty enhancement, recruitment and retention strategies, development, and implementation of innovative methods involving curriculum and/or preceptorships.

In the college's application for the Professional, Nursing Shortage Reduction Program (NSRP) administration over-estimated the number of traditional track ADN graduates. While 127 graduates were projected, only 112 traditional track students successfully graduated from the program in FY 18 – 19. The college was required to reimburse the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) \$129,869 for the over-funded amount. On November 26, 2019, the board ratified this reimbursement. In the same application for NSRP Funds, administration under-estimated the number of transfer track ADN graduates. While 64 graduates were projected, 118 transfer track students successfully graduated from the program in FY 18 – 19. The THECB is now reconciling the difference by providing additional funding for \$409,308.87. This allocation of additional funding was in the final reconciliation of the college's FY 18 - 19 NSRP Program Funding and reflects a net increase of \$279,439.87 in additional funds which supported nursing student success.

The S-STEM grant provided scholarships to two cohorts of 20 undergraduate students pursuing an associate's degree in biology, chemistry, computer science, engineering, mathematics, and physics. The project helped increase student persistence, retention, transfer, and graduation in STEM fields by linking scholarships with structured student professional development activities, including faculty mentoring, tutoring, undergraduate research experiences, internships, and participation in discipline-specific conferences. Before pursuing this grant, the Department of Resource Development, Management and Compliance, and the Division for Math, Science, and Bachelor Programs coordinated efforts to provide professional development for faculty and Grant Development Officers focused on developing strong proposals for National Science Foundation (NSF) grants. In 2018, The Grant Training Center conducted training titled Designing Winning National Science Foundation Proposals. The college had not received a grant directly from NSF, as the lead fiscal agent, for over 14 years.

This grant aligns with Strategic Direction #3, to Create Educational Opportunities for Students and Strategic Direction #4, Foster Student Success, by providing educational opportunities that enable a seamless transfer to advanced degrees and by providing an effective support structure that promotes persistence, educational attainment, academic achievement, personal and professional growth.

This award fund was associated with professional development for Transfer Partnership Strategy (TPS) on topics such as improving collaboration and strengthening applicability advising. South Texas College (STC) is one of 26 institutions that was invited to participate in TPS, which allowed access to technical expertise from three national partners (HCM Strategists LLC, Aspen, and SOVA) providing customized data reports that include metrics, transfer student outcomes, and opportunities to contribute to improving transfer at our institution, as well as across the state.

Participating institutions were able to:

- Identify a transfer team responsible for attending an April 2020 convening and participating in TPS technical assistance and events
- Set (or reaffirm existing) institutional transfer goals using the Institutional Practice Framework and Tools co-developed with our national partners; and
- Contributed to a shared communications campaign that elevates the work of the TPS institutions in the state of national media.

The purpose of the Carl D. Perkins Basic Grant is to improve graduation, retention, access, quality, and to provide for the expansion of Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs. After initial allocations were awarded, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) issued a reallocation of available remaining funds to applicants who met or exceeded the state target rates on Core Indicators 2P1: Credential, Certificate, or Diploma; 3P1: Student Retention or Transfer; and, 4P1: Student Placement. These funds were used for instructional resources and equipment for CTE programs. With this reallocation, the Perkins Basic Grant for this funding period totals \$2,082,963.

The President of the college authorized and accepted the Jobs for the Future (JFF) grant award under the authority granted by the Board on March 31, 2020, as outlined in Resolution 2020-010. The diversification of the Robotics and Industrial Automation program was developed in three phases to help meet the demands of the manufacturing industry, especially in technology-dependent sectors. Phase I of the project included, FANUC Certification followed by Phase II: Industry 4.0 Upgrade and lastly Phase III: Marketing Campaign.

This grant was awarded to the Institute for Advanced Manufacturing (IAM) which provided two online instruction Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) based summer camps designed to provide students with disabilities (ages 14-22) the opportunity to learn about STEM occupations. Students were instructed through the Microsoft Teams online platform along with providing each student with an Instructional Coach to assist with activities for the Lego Ev3 and Arduino Camp, an open-source electronics platform-based hardware and software kit. This grant provided the IAM an opportunity to work with students with disabilities, enhance their learning experience through interactive learning, and encourage students to persist in STEM-related studies. Computer Science faculty and FIRST RGV provided curriculum development and online instruction for both camps.

The training was focused on occupations that included Auto Service Technician, Industrial Maintenance, Heating, Ventilation, Air Conditioning (HVAC), Maintenance, and Machinist for a total of thirty-five apprentices. The IAM identified employers in the areas of HVAC including local manufacturing companies and automobile dealerships that served as employment sites and provided RA On-the-Job Training. Existing business partners approved for apprenticeship programs by the Department of Labor include Legacy Precision, LLC, Woodcrafters Home Products, 5 X 5 Brewing Company, Atlas Electric, Bert Ogden Mission Chevrolet, Brewsome Brewery, DoubleTree Suites, MS Industrial Automation and Repairs, and Priority Tooling Solutions.

The original award was \$173,470.60 as approved by the board of trustees in December 2018. The additional funds of \$7,709.40 bring the total to \$181,180. Additional funds were used for curriculum development and tuition. The amendment includes an extension to the funding period to June 30, 2020. This award aligns with Strategic Direction #1, Lead Community Engagement by Strengthening and developing partnerships with local organizations to align educational opportunities with community and workforce needs that contribute toward the economic mobility of the region.

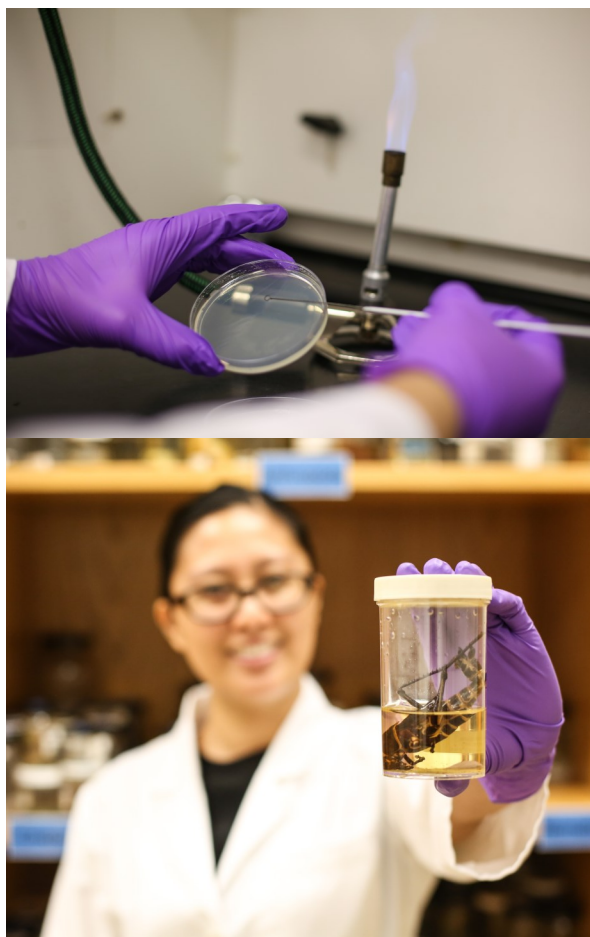

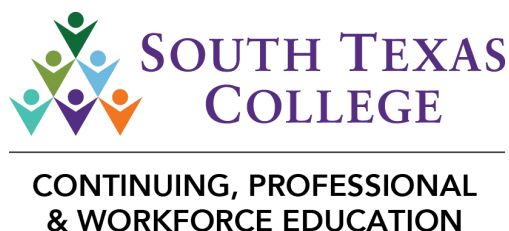

Through this grant, STC received \$485,446 and RGV Med, LLC received \$749,621.

In March of 2020, President Donald J. Trump issued a proclamation declaring a national emergency for the Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) outbreak. H.R. 748 – 116th was passed by the U.S. Congress in response to its impact on the economy, public, health, state and local governments, individuals, and businesses. Within the CARES Act, Section 18004 – Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) provided funding for educational institutions that included South Texas College.

Each of the CARES Act HEERF funds allocated to South Texas College is summarized below. The Department of Resource Development, Management, and Compliance provides technical assistance, guidance, and monitors grants for compliance with federal regulations.

These funds are being used to provide emergency financial aid grants to students for expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to coronavirus (including eligible expenses under a student's cost of attendance such as food, housing, course materials, technology, health care, and child care).

The college established an application process for students to request support through CARES Act Funding. This process allowed the administration to evaluate each student for eligibility under federal guidelines and facilitated the timely disbursement of \$600 to each student.

South Texas College (STC) was allocated funds for Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund, (HEERF) Institutional Portion under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. This allocation is managed by the Division of Finance and Administrative Services. Vice President Mary G. Elizondo serves as the Project Director for this federal award, and Myriam Lopez is the Financial Manager. These funds will be used to cover costs associated with significant changes to the delivery of instruction due to the coronavirus so long as such costs did not include payment to contractors for the provision of pre-enrollment recruitment activities, including marketing and advertising; endowments; or capital outlays associated with facilities related to athletics, sectarian instruction, or religious worship. Institutional costs must have first incurred on or after March 13, 2020, the date of the proclamation of national emergency.

The college is using the funds to reimburse institutional costs as a reasoned basis for concluding such costs. There were significant changes to the delivery of instruction due to coronavirus, including instructional material and equipment, preparing faculty and staff for the transition to online instruction and temporary off-campus assignments related to COVID-19 disruptions.

This allocation is managed by the Division of Student Affairs and Enrollment Management. Vice President Mathew Hebbard serves as the Project Director for this federal award and Miguel Carranza is the Financial Manager. The college has the flexibility to use these funds to defray expenses incurred by the college, including lost revenue, reimbursement for expenses already incurred, technology costs associated with a transition to distance education, faculty and staff training, and payroll. Instead, the Board of Trustees and the college administration chose to use these funds to assist students with their cost of attendance, including food, housing, course materials, technology, health care, and child care.

The college administration is using these funds to establish two separate grant-supported scholarship funds to:

- Provide \$250 in support to eligible students matriculating from dual credit programs who enroll at the college to continue their higher education career; and
- Supported eligible students with micro-scholarships to cover qualified expenses.

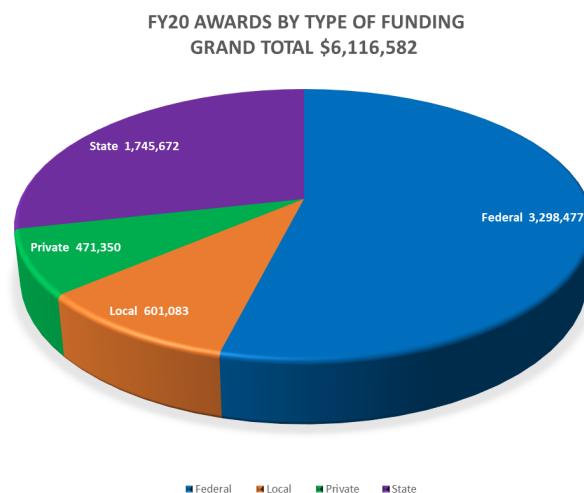


FY20 Awards by Type of Funding

South Texas College (STC) receives federal, state, local and private foundation funds. A federal grant is an award from the United States Government. Federal grants fund projects that provide public services and/or stimulate the economy. The federal government awards state and local governments, universities, researchers, colleges, law enforcement agencies, and others. The National Science Foundation (NSF) and the Department of Agriculture (USDA) were a some of our federal grantors this year.

The Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) also provides state grants to carry out approved projects or activities within defined guidelines in support of a public purpose. The Texas Workforce Commission awarded the majority of state grants received by South Texas College in FY20. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) also awarded funds to the college. Local grants and contracts from the City of McAllen, the Rio Grande Valley Partnership Foundation in partnership with the Lower Rio Workforce Development Board, and the local Workforce Development Board awarded small to medium-sized grants. These grants are to provide program services that benefit individuals who reside or are employed in our area. Private foundations are established to pursue charitable purposes and their missions and interests are varied. Foundations award grants to nonprofits that support their own mission. Many large corporations have a foundation to support projects, scholarship funds, and other needs that align to the mission and interests of the foundation. There are also various other private foundations that are established by individuals with a common cause or a defined mission.

As shown in Figure 1, the largest amount of funds awarded to STC in fiscal year 2020 (FY20) were federal. Over \$3M was awarded from federal funds. Almost \$2M came from the Carl D. Perkins Grant. The second largest amount awarded to the college were state grants, which amounted to \$1,745,672. Local entities awarded \$601,083 and private foundations awarded \$471,350 to the college. The total amount of funding awarded to South Texas College in FY20 was \$6,116,582 not including CARES Act fund allocations, which were a total of \$21,277,487.



Special thanks to all who contribute toward the continued success of South Texas College. Our collective efforts to secure external funds through grants expands the capacity of the college to achieve its mission and goals.
