

- Coordinated review and planning meetings focused on each of the four major components of the grants
- Worked with the Purchasing Department to initiate the process to identify a qualified external evaluator for the grant

Academic Coaching Strategy

- ▶ DHSI Goal 1. Provide students with accessible pathways that promote persistence, educational attainment, academic achievement, personal and professional growth. (Aligned to Institutional Goal Foster Student Success).
- Objective 1.1 Increase Fall to Fall Persistence among Bachelor Program by 2% annually by implementing InsideTrack® Coaching.
- Objective 1.2 Increase the Fall to Fall Persistence among STEM and Computer Science Associate Degree Programs by 2% annually.



- ► Focused on a partnership with InsideTrack® with contract being fully executed in March 2021
 - What is InsideTrack®?
 - An independent company that offers student support services to colleges and universities nationwide called "Academic Coaching" as one-on-one intervention designed to work with at-risk students by focusing on their strengths, goals, study skills, degree of engagement, academic planning and overall college performance.


- ▶ What is the objective of InsideTrack® and Academic Coaching?
 - To empower STC staff with a coaching model that supports them in reaching the right students with the right resources at the right time so as to remove obstacles to student success and lead to greater year-over-year student persistence.





- Scope of Training
 - Foundational Training 20 Coaches selected
 - Reinforcement Training has been scheduled for the remainder of the year
 - 10 Coaches selected to advance to InsideTrack® Student Coaching Certification
 - Train-the-Trainer Model (3 out of the 10 selected)
 - Supervisor Training has been completed
- Quality Management Training has been scheduled for 2021 and first quarter of 2022
 - Coaching sessions recorded and evaluated by InsideTrack® Trainer

- InsideTrack® Program Diagnostic Report Completed
 - Designed to grow and develop STC's ability to retain students through utilization of a coaching methodology, professional development and role clarity
 - Included SWOT Analysis and in-depth interviews with STC's staff, faculty, students and leadership team to gauge workflows, processes and culture
 - Recommendations to be addressed and implemented in Year 2 with Grant Stakeholders



Academic Coaching Purpose and Sustainability

- South Texas College and InsideTrack® have a shared vision to support the development of a robust coaching model resulting in improved retention rates
- Coaching model will unlock the potential of members of the student services team by moving them towards an efficient infrastructure that includes role clarity, consistent processes and a shared responsibility for student persistence and retention
- Develop a Sustainability Plan for Continuous Academic Coaching Practices
 - Will provide proactive student support
 - High Return on Investment

Online Tutoring Strategy

- DHSI Goal 2. Provide accessible and inclusive educational opportunities that enable seamless transfer to advanced degrees or align with emerging workforce needs. (Aligned to Institutional Goal - Create Educational Opportunities for Students).
- Objective 2.1 Increase access to online tutoring by offering 3 courses per year in years 1-4.
- Objective 2.2 At least 70% of students who receive a minimum of 4 online tutoring sessions will pass the courses for which they received online tutoring per year.

Online Tutoring Year 1 Highlights



- Hired three fully remote online tutors to provide tutoring services for Math 1414, Chemistry 1411 and English 1301
- Expanded tutoring services by providing sessions after Centers for Learning Excellence facilities hours
- Successfully advocated for institutionalization of the Learning Excellence Specialist for Online Programs position



Online Tutoring – Resource Development







Hunting-gathering is what is normally thought in regards of Native Americans. They roamed the land, finding what they could eat.


Pastoralism is the use and care of livestock to subsist and trade.

Goods from as far away as Mexico have been found in the midwestern United States.








To compare, Paris was the most populated European city at the time of Tenochtitlan, with a population of **225,000**.

Financial Literacy Strategy

- ▶ DHSI Goal 3. Increase students' ability to effectively manage debt and stay on a path leading to program completion and employment.
- Objective 3.1 Serve at least 2,000 Hispanic FTIC students in year 1 with an increase of an additional 250 each year in years 2-5 with Financial Literacy services.
- Objective 3.2 Increase student's perception of knowledge gained in financial and economic literacy among 75% of Hispanic FTIC students served per year with Financial Literacy services.


- Created a Financial Literacy Committee consisting of 20 key stakeholders across the STC community to ensure seamless delivery of Financial Wellness Center services
- Researched various online money management tools in effort to identify the best fit for student financial wellness and the success of meeting grant goals
- Worked closely with STC IT team to ensure quality and functionality of the selected model and platform to facilitate Financial Wellness Services and executed iGrad contract in July 2021
- Worked with RAS team to retrieve data which reflected the targeted population of Hispanic, FTIC students on Financial aid for outreach and project campaign purposes
- Launched the official South Texas College Financial
 Wellness Center services and online platform Fall 2021




- Identified "collaboration zones" throughout the STC community such as Cashiers, Financial Aid, Counseling & Advising in conjunction with the Office of Career & Employer Services for computer lab areas offering financial wellness services and extending across the STC Academic division and into the classroom
- Worked closely with STC Marketing team to develop a marketing plan to promote an awareness of financial literacy and services through the dissemination of mass mailouts, emails, and six course assignments incorporated into the Learning Frameworks instruction through the (iGrad) STC Financial Wellness Center platform



- The Financial Wellness Center's resources include tools and courses related to the following as outlined specifically in the grant:
 - Money management
 - Budget
 - Credit/debit
 - Savings and investing
 - Credit scores
 - Financial aid for students

Financial Wellness Services Sustainability and its Value

- Develop a Title V Sustainability Plan for Financial Wellness Services to include Continuous Improvement efforts
- Assess student's ability to effectively manage debt and stay on a path leading to program completion
- Review data results and refine procedures, services and accessibility for future and all students with the intent to institutionalize Financial Wellness Services and sustain the iGrad online tool to facilitate money management

- The Financial Literacy and Education Commission recommends colleges to implement financial wellness awareness on campuses for students because:
 - Reduces financial stress which has been proven to lead to success in college and beyond
 - Lowers student loan defaults
 - Increases student retention
 - ✓ Increases academic achievement
 - Timely graduation




Starfish Strategy

- ▶ DHSI Goal 4. Increase accessibility to an expanded use of Technology-Based Resources (Starfish). (Aligned to Institutional Strategic Goal - Promote Academic Integrity and Excellence)
- Objective 4.1 At least 75% of students who receive Starfish direct intervention support will successfully pass their course(s) for which they were flagged in Starfish.
- Objective 4.2 At least 70% of students who receive Starfish direct intervention support will re-enroll the following semester.

Starfish Year 1 Highlights

- Hired Starfish Administrator in May 2021 to provide service and resource access to students, faculty and staff
- Updated website to improve access to Starfish, with step-by-step PDF and video instructions
 - First month analytics included 400 hits on Starfish Login Button





Starfish Year 1 Highlights

- Developed System Integration Plan to introduce Meta Major Cohorts for Guided Pathway Specialists Assignments
- Developed an annual Starfish Training Calendar and provided monthly trainings, ongoing weekly trainings, Starfish Caucus and Coffee Collaborative



Starfish Year 1 Highlights



- Updated and designed service components for Distance Learning and CLE Online Tutoring Services
- Created new scope for 2021-2022 objectives of Roles and Relationship Optimization within Starfish
- Established a Starfish Taskforce who serve as liaisons for Starfish awareness and collaboration
- Created and placed digital signage on campus monitors college-wide
